The judging panel was chaired by Panamanian academic, Juan David Morgan, and included Lord Garel-Jones from the UK; Victoria Hernandez Salcedo, a Colombian actress; Javier El-Hage, a Bolivian attorney and former Fullbright scholar; Yara Iveth Campos from Panama's Electoral Court; Dr. Stanley Muschett, a Panamian academic and Claudia Gurisatti Barreto, a Colombian journalist.

The final was hosted by Ismael Cala, a renowned journalist from CNN, and the Panamanian singer Erika Ender.
